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EDITORIAL (by Alan Borwell)

With due respect to Val Nye, I have had to move his Secretarial Notes in this Bulletin to page 2, because this editorial is longer than usual and contains a number of rather important matters.

Firstly, my apologies for not achieving the target month for publication of January every effort will be made to publish numbers 5 and 6 in May and September!

Due to increasing business and other commitments, I shall be unable to continue as Editor of the Bulletin after No. 6, but I would be willing to give some limited help to my successor, if required. It would be greatly appreciated if anyone who might be prepared to become Editor or to assist with the Bulletin, could indicate such willingness either to Val Nye or myself an soon as possible.

Despite earlier favourable indications, it is particularly disappointing to have to report that Scotland's application for affiliation to ICCF once again met with a negative decision by its Praesidium in Austria last September. Information was provided about other international sporting and recreational bodies which do accept Scotland into membership, such as Chess, Soccer, Rugby, Bowling, Hockey, Golf, etc.

The attitude of ICCF on this matter is very difficult to understand, but we can only hope the 1981 Congress in England will reconsider the implications of all its Statutes to Scotland's (and Wales') applications. Currently the ruling does nothing to promote international postal chess and it is particularly unfair to the players in the two Countries directly affected and ICCF Statutes specify that 'political' discrimination is not permitted.

Bearing in mind that the Scottish Chess Association, as the oldest national federation in the World for over the board chess, has been affiliated to FIDE since 1932, and plays its full part in World chess, it is not acceptable for ICCF to refuse to recognise Scotland for international correspondence chess purposes.

In view of the seriousness which this Association takes of almost 10 years of exclusion from official international competition, a special sub-committee has been formed to consider all possible courses of action which could be more successful in achieving proper recognition for Scotland's postal chess players. The sub-committee will report to the SCCA Executive Committee in March and a report will be included in our next Bulletin.

Rather ironically, Scotland will be participating in the 2nd World Telechess Olympiad which is an event jointly organised by FIDE and ICCF. We have entered a team in conjunction with the SCA and our matches will be sponsored by the Scottish Telecommunications Board. The first round pairings are awaited. A short report on this event appears on page 16 of this Bulletin.

As you will know, 1981 is the International Year of the Disabled, and we have been asked to enquire whether any of our members know of any disabled chess players who might be interested in playing in a disabled chess event. I shall be pleased to hear about any physically disabled players who might have an interest, when I shall forward their names and addresses to the organisers.

As most of the games in this Bulletin were played last season, it was decided that they should also be eligible for consideration for the Best Games prize, along with those appearing in Bulletins 1, 2 and 3. A Best Games prize of £10 for the current season will be selected from games appearing in Bulletins 5, 6 and 7.

Your Executive Committee will be considering possible forms of competition with rather less exacting time limits, say 10 moves per 30 days, covering perhaps 18 months/ 2 years. These could be attractive to players who find the annual events 'too quick' and therefore are unable to play. Any reader with views should make them known to one of the office-bearers as soon as possible.

Finally, could we have some more letters from readers for possible publication in future editions of the Bulletin.

SECRETARIAL NOTES (by Val Nye)



A good New Year to all our readers and welcome to this the first issue of the second volume of the Bulletin! The start of a New Year is, by custom, a time when we take stock and look to the future, so I might as well do the same. On the black side, postal charges always are on the increase and despite our increased range of activities, membership is not increasing as much as we would like. As national organisations go, we are relatively young - there are many which are over thirty years old. The thing we must do is to let people know about us and what we have to offer. Certainly, the addition to three new Controllers does help to sp read the effort needed to run our tournaments. 'Many hands make light work' is the old saying! We are indebted to Gordon Anderson (who also finds time to be a rugby referee), Bill Brady (who innocently found himself the victime in 3 of the games published in the last Bulletin!) and Ian Mitchell.

This season we introduced a Candidates Tournament into the Championship events, and this should prove a successful innovation. Ten of the places in the Candidates were filled automatically by players 'relegated' from the Final and also with one player from each of the previous Premier sections. The remaining place was taken by the highest graded player of the two still on the entry list.

In passing, I must mention a problem that occurred to me and which I have discussed (only briefly I must add!) with one or two of my academic colleagues. I shall call it the 'single pairing problem'. Up until now we have had only one tournament - the Final - in which players play each other only once. Last season, for example, I played one game against Bill Brady and according to a 'standard draw' I was assigned the white pieces. This season we are both in the new event - the Candidates - which is a single game event, so the draw was made subject to the constraint that Bill has white against me. This idea of 'colour reversal' has always been in operation in the Final. The only constraint upon the draw, namely that those staying in the Final should have their colours mutually reversed, does not present any problem (as Bernard Partridge will readily agree!). The question is: can we guarantee automatic 'colour reversal' in future Finals which will consist of not one but two sets of players (one from the previous Candidates and the second consisting of those staying up in the Final)? By way of example (from which a pattern can emerge), suppose Richard Beecham and Jimmy Williams stayed up in the Final while Bill Brady and myself were promoted. Then the draw for the next Final would have to try to ensure that Jimmy was black against Richard, and that I was white against Bill. If we adopt a pragmatic approach, messing around with pencil and paper once the next finalist s are known, the draw might resolve itself - with the help of suitable liquid stimulants or aspirins So far, I am not aware of any 'general solution'! Anyway, your ideas will be welcome!

We were a little disappointed in the response to the Openings Tournament. Certainly I think we should persevere with such a competition since a player has the chance to explore very thoroughly particular opening lines. Should we propose several lines instead of just one - a king pawn, a queen pawn, and another, for example? Your views please!

Thanks to assistance from the SCA circulation, we have a record entry in the League. The top 6 teams from last season form the 1st Division, whilst the other 14 were split into two sections of roughly equal strength. On the result s of this we can look forward, hoping that even more teams join next season, to the League having at least 3 Divisions.

I received an interesting point of view from Scott Young, who is a North Sea Diver (rather him then me!!) He would like to have an endings tournament. The argument, basically, is that the typical chess player rarely has a game going through to the ending. A result will usually have been agreed between two players or the <u>middle game</u> position will have been adjudicated. Because of a player's lack of experience in the endings, the adjudicated result may not necessarily be actual outcome if the game were played to the bitter end! Your views please!

Lastly, some feedback from the 'whoops' article. One player (who shall be nameless!) in this season's Quartets may not have properly digested (if that is the right word) the article since he fell into the 'p-kn3, if any then b-n2' trap Several players have told me about posting moves to themselves, and setting up wrong positions seems quite commonplace!? Mind you, Ken Stewart came up with one that I had forgotten. His Swedish opponent had asked for a temporary cessat ion of play because he had just become the father of twins. On resumption of the game, Ken naturally enough offered congratulations etc. A few days later, Ken received a card thanking him but also asking him what his intended moves were - he had not written down his moves!

PERSONALITIES OF THE ASSOCIATION - N0.4 IAIN CAMPBELL (by Val Nye)

The first time I met lain was in the pavilion of the Hillhead rugby ground. I was playing in a Glasgow League match against the now defunct Hillhead FP team. Despite lain's loyal support, the Hillhead FP's were always having trouble raising a team (a match captain's perennial problem!) All the same, they used to get some good results against the more fancied teams.

lain was born in Knightswood in Glasgow. After his schooling at Hillhead, he went to Glasgow University. In 1967 he emerged (to quote lain's own words!) with a feeble MA in History. He decided against going into teaching and went instead into the Civil Service. With a natural career progression he was moved to the Post Office Savings Bank at Cowglen to look after the public's interests. He has recently been given the good opportunity to improve his prospects by a part-time study course. Along with a select group of his colleagues, he is applying himself to acquiring a professional qualification in Accountancy. Although this is making great inroads into his spare time - and he has felt, in his typically conscientious way, that he should give up his committee and controlling work with us for a while - the effort is worth it in the long run.

Iain took up correspondence play about 1965, playing in the Quartets that Bernard Partridge was organising. He narrowly missed qualifying for the Championship Final at his early attempts, being a runner-up in the Premier on several occasions. Although he has not managed to win the Final, his results have been quietly impressive (two 2nd equals and a 2nd are to his credit). He has taken part in several International matches (seven is the exact number!) In fact, he is waiting to be picked for a match against Denmark so that he can become a founder member of a 'I have played all the Scandinavians' club! In a recently completed ICCF Class 1 Tournament (which lasted about 18 months), he scored 6/6, and he is hoping eventually to play in a Master class

When Bernard Partridge was looking for a few 'likely lads' to help establish our Association, lain was an automatic choice. He had some very useful points to make, for example, when we were drawing up the Playing Rules, and he has been a successful controller of the Premier.

Letter sent by the Association to The Post Office, with a copy to the Secretary of State for Scotland 'On behalf of the Correspondence Chess players in SCOTLAND, we wish to protest about the recent massive increase in postal charges for chess postcards to overseas countries. Prior to 26 Jan. 1981 the charges were 10½p to Europe and 14p to U.S.A., but the new rates are 18p and 20p respectively. As such cards contain little more content than a typical greetings card, we feel that it would have been reasonable to have provided for these postcards at Printed Paper rates ie. 14p and 20p, respectively. A typical example of an international postal chess card is enclosed and we await your considered reply in due course.

READERS LETTER

Dear Editor,

I was pleased to see a response to my article on Telephone Chess but feel I have given the wrong impression as to my approach. The rules and procedure I quoted were those of the organising body. My personal approach is reflected in the premier section which was run some 5 years ago and which I controlled. The players were advised to come to mutual arrangement regarding the telephoning and to enjoy it. As far as I was concerned, there were no problems and the section was completed, strangely enough, not much before the other CC sections. The vast majority of players don't need rules to play CC, they just keep in mind the time control and the adj.date, and with that they get on with it. The same applies to Telephone Chess.

So, at the third time of asking, if any players are interested in playing by telephone and consider themselves to be members of the 'vast majority', then let the Association know you are willing to try it. We seem to have two potential players in Ken Beer and George Weeden. I like Ken's idea of repeating previous move in tele-chess. This should help to prevent misunderstandings.
