SCOTTISH CORRESPONDENCE CHESS ASSOCIATION
Office-Bearers & Membership 1982-83

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The AGM has come round once again - and the Minutes (which can be ratified only at the next AGM) are given elsewhere in this Bulletin. The new Executive has already had its first meeting (in the middle of August) and besides reviewing the old season, it discussed plans for the new season. On the whole, last season was reasonably successful and the Association continues to offer a good range of tournaments and is engaged in several international matches, (In passing I had better mention that the section winners of the telephone tournament are having a play-off and there is also a small 'friendly', thanks to the efforts of Bill Jenkins).

One niggling feature once again last season was that some players stopped play but did not bother to tell anybody. A letter (or phone call) to a Controller could have avoided any bad feeling and the waste of time involved in the Controller having to try to find out what had happened. An opponent caught up in this situation could be left thinking - until the withdrawal has been confirmed - that the scorecard may have been lost in the post etc. A second even more puzzling feature is that there have again been a few players - who ought to know better - who did not hand in results. They could have been awarded losses, despite achieving a draw (or win), as this is possible according to our Playing Rules. All right, so a player may not be in line for a prize - but every result affects grading. Many OTB players are almost neurotic (for want of a better word!?) when it comes to working out how their grading changes with results of games. So why should the average CC player not be concerned with his grading?!

At the time of writing Alan Borwell and George Livie were en route for the ICCF meeting in Paris (Editor - see brief report on page 23). There had been a lengthy discussion, during the Executive meeting, on various matters relating to international chess and a number of good points and arguments were made. Through Alan and George we hoped to make a good and useful contribution to the ICCF meeting. Certainly, the Executive feels that we should be seen to be developing our links with other countries and to be taking a keen interest in International affairs.

Coming back to domestic matters, please note that Tom Craig is taking over the editorship of the Bulletin from Alan Borwell. Like Alan, and all of the regular contributors, Tom is using his spare time for the Bulletin. It is not always possible to meet a particular deadline - in fact I am a couple of days late with this article - so that there may be a delay factor in producing and sending out the Bulletin to our readers. The only way to get round this, I suppose, would be to have people employed by the Association to produce the Bulletin - but this is not likely to come about for a long time! Meanwhile, we wish Tom every success with his efforts as our new Editor.



EDITORIAL (by Tom Craig)

Following Alan is not easy. There was much apprehension when he produced the first issue in January 1980; some thought the magazine would expire as quickly as it had been conceived. The Scottish Correspondence Chess Association magazine has not only flourished but also it has grown.

This issue is a collaboration between Alan Borwell, Richard Beecham and myself. Severe time pressure and production difficulties are always a problem, but this issue would not have been possible without their co-operation.

The planning and preparation of the next issue is already under way and I would appreciate hearing from anyone who would be interested in providing an article.

The next issue of the News Bulletin is due to be published in January 1983.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held at the North British Hotel, Glasgow, at 11am on Sunday 15th June 1982.

Present: C.R. Beecham, A.P. Borwell, D. Cowling, T.J. Craig, K. Cordon, A.T. Hislop, J. Junnor, D.M. Livie, G.W.G. Livie, V.A. Nye, A..J. McClelland, A.J. Shaw, J. Ward and T.S. Wickens.

Apologies were received from G.M. Anderson, I.S. Campbell, D.A. Kilgour, D.G.McRoberts. I.W.S. Mitchell, R. Mitchell. W. Munn and B.B. Partridge.

President's Report

After welcoming members to the AGM, the President, Alan Borwell, emphasised how indebted the Association was to the office-bearers, members of the Executive Committee and also to the Controllers for looking after its affairs. It was good that there were many members involved in helping the Association.

The President went on to describe the discussions held with ICCF officials at the ICCF Congress in London and stressed how important it was for the Association to have representatives at ICCF meetings. Valuable contacts could be made and useful discussions held with representatives from other countries, and arrangements were in hand for George Livie and himself to attend again at the forthcoming ICCF Praesidium in Paris this August. He concluded by noting that teams had been selected to represent Scotland in the Preliminaries of the 10th Olympiad and the 3rd European Team Championship, these events being due to start in the Autumn.

The Minutes of the previous AGM, which had been published in Bulletin No.6, were approved.

Secretary's Report

The Secretary began by describing how arrangements were made for the Final, Candidates, Premier, Major, Quartet events, Openings and other individual tournaments. A record number of 100 players (in 20 teams) were taking part in the League, which was now organised in three divisions. Enough interest had been shown to make a Telephone tournament viable and this had been included in this season's events and a Classification tournament had started in May 1982, which should also become established. Although at present we had a comparatively small membership, we maintained a wide range of events for the correspondence chess players of Scotland and we looked forward to a progressive increase in the size of our organisation.

The Secretary then noted that as a result of his excellent performances in recent Scottish Championships, Douglas Bryson had been awarded the Scottish Master title. (The President remarked that the criteria for this award were comparable with those of other countries but a natural step was for our players to look for International Master titles and norms for these were obtainable in ICCF Individual and team events). The Association had collaborated with the SCA in the Telechess Olympiad and in the first round, the Scottish team had beaten Norway. However, we had been beaten by an extremely strong Russian team (which had then beaten England in the next round!) One benefit from the friendly contacts made at the ICCF meeting in London was that we could look forward to further international matches arranged as friendlies, in addition to the official ICCF team events. Two such matches, for example, were about to commence with West Germany and Argentina.

Once again, there had been several Executive Committee meetings during the season, to ensure the good running of the Association's affairs.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer began by noting that he had again been able to call upon the good office of Hamish Bell to audit the books.

Compared with the previous season, the surplus had dropped significantly. Rising postal charges accounted for a major share of this and could be seen in the figures for the Controllers' expenses, Bulletin expenses and Secretarial expenses. There was also, for the first time, the necessary item of (ICCF) Conference Expenses. Most of the Stationery Expenses this season were involved with the new Rules Brochure. To help offset the (administrative) expenses, we had received a grant from the SCA. (The President indicated the bodies affiliated to the SCA could apply for such a grant and we could anticipate similar grants in the future).

The Treasurer noted that, following a query from Hamish Bell, the bank had deducted too much by way of service charges. This had been ascertained too late for adjustment in the present Financial Statement and the £7 involved would appear as contributing to next season's income.

In discussion, the President noted that £150 was the amount that the Executive Committee had agreed in principle to provide towards the expenses of himself and George Livie when they attended the ICCF Presidium in Paris this coming August. The Treasurer reported the feeling of other Committee Members that this amount would not in any way cover all reasonable expenses and thanked the two officers for offering to bear the remaining costs.

T.J. Craig raised a point concerning how we might possibly increase the sales of the Bulletin and wondered if we would profit by selling the Bulletin at a discount to SCA members. The meeting felt that, firstly, this could prove difficult to implement satisfactorily and, in addition, our own members may be disadvantaged. A related point was raised by K. Gordon; he wondered about the possibility of contacting a national newsagent such as Menzies with a view to having the Bulletin sold directly to the public. This idea was favourably received by the meeting and the new Executive would look into it.

C.R. Beecham proposed that the meeting adopt the Financial Statement (as shown on page 4) and this motion was seconded, by T.J. Craig and approved by the meeting.

Constitution

The President outlined the reasons why the Executive thought that certain changes were needed in our Constitution. Because of increased activities, it was felt desirable to have a separate Secretary and Treasurer and also to increase the size of the Executive. There was, moreover, a need to allow for the creation of committees which would look after various matters on behalf of the Association: as our Constitution stood at present, only one specific (sub)committee was allowed. The Executive's proposals, which had been presented in issue No.8 of the News Bulletin (page 2), were intended to take these points into account. After a brief discussion, the meeting adopted the proposals.

The Secretary noted that the Executive had discussed a possible change to Article 4 of the Constitution since it did not allow for members joining during the season. After some discussion, it was decided that the Executive should look into this and put an appropriate proposal at the next AGM.

Election of Executive Council

The following Office-Bearers were elected:

President - A.P. Borwell; Vice-President - G.W.G. Livie; Secretary - V.A. Nye;
Assistant Secretary - A.T. Hislop; Treasurer - A.J. Shaw; Grading Officer - D.M. Livie;
International Secretary - D.A. Kilgour; Publicity and Membership Officer - T.J. Craig.
Messrs. C.R. Beecham, I.S. Campbell and T.S. Wickens were also elected to the Executive Council.

The meeting noted with regret that K. Gordon and I.W.S. Mitchell were unable to continue to be on the Executive and the President thanked them for their efforts.

Election of Auditor

After noting the excellent services of Hamish Bell, the meeting recommended that the Secretary should write to Mr. Bell to thank him and to invite him to be our Auditor for the next season.

Subscriptions

The Executive's recommendation was that the ordinary subscription should be raised from £3 to £3.50 but that all other fees should remain as they were. Despite the effects of rising costs and inflation, the Association would continue to provide members with a wide range of correspondence chess activities for very low fees. The meeting adopted the Executive's recommendation.

Tournaments

There was a feeling that a closing date of September 30th was too early for entry to some of our events. A later closing date could possibly help us increase membership especially in that many OTB clubs do not start until the end of September. Given a later start for an event, an automatic implication was that the adjudication date would also have to be moved. It was felt that no sweeping change in starting dates should be made without giving members reasonable notice, but it was agreed that the closing date for all events be moved to the middle of October for the forthcoming season. The Championship Final and the Candidates were events where the potential entry should be known well in advance and these could be started as soon as was practicable.

A final point was that there was a good range of tournaments that the Association offered and that there was no need, as yet, to introduce new events.

Playing Rules

The Secretary queried whether the use of the word 'immediate' which occurs in Rule 16 should be replaced by a specific time period. He also referred to Rule 37 and wondered whether we should incorporate wording to the effect that an 'aggrieved player' should give notification that he is seeking 'expert evidence', such as a confirmation by the GPO of certain details. There was also the point that our Playing Rules were perhaps a 'Playing Code', in that failure to observe certain of the Rules did not entail a penalty.

In discussion, the President suggested that changes should be made only if there was a fundamental point at issue. For example, the replacement of the word 'immediate' in Rule 16 would not make for any greater clarification of that Rule. Similarly, no change was thought to be needed in Rule 37 as the provision of 'expert evidence' should have been to hand when the player concerned was giving information to his Controller.

Any Other Business

- a. G.W.G. Livie showed the Walter Roach Trophy to the meeting, which was to be awarded to (and retained by) the winner of the play-off between the winners of the sections in the Openings Tournament. He also showed a Shield which he was presenting to the Association for Division 2 of the League. The President expressed appreciation to Mr. Livie.
- b. The Secretary asked for suggested modifications to the Rules Brochure. Besides the inclusion of information about the Classification and Telephone Tournaments, a short article on grading matters was thought to be a useful additional feature.

After a vote of thanks to the chair, the meeting closed at 1.05pm.

GRADING MATTERS (by Douglas Livie)

The popularity of correspondence chess is very evident from the increasing number of players taking part in events organised by the Scottish Correspondence Chess Association. Further development is likely as the association gains greater recognition and more members participate in I.C.C.F. and B.P.C.F. events.

Congratulations are due to Philip Giulian and Douglas Bryson. The former has been awarded two norms as a result of winning the S.C.C.A. Championship and for his grading in that tournament. Philip also competed with merit in the finals of the British Postal Chess Federation Championship. Unfortunately outstanding adjudications prevent this event being graded at the present time as the full table of results is not available. Douglas Bryson won the B.P.C.F. Candidates 'C' and has qualified to play in the championship next year. He has this year achieved the highest grading of any S.C.C.A. Recognised player.

Robert Dickson and Robert McBrayne were not quite so active as last year playing only 32 and 25 games respectively!! Mrs.E.Hartford has gained the distinction of being the first woman to win a place in the S.C.C.A. Candidates. We wish her continued success and in the future hope to see more ladies competing in correspondence chess events at all levels.

Games other than in S.C.C.A. or I.C.C.F. events can be graded only if the competitor advises the Grading Officer of the details of the event within two months of its commencement.

The main grading list once again consists of:

- (a) Recognised players - those who have twenty or more recorded results against recognised or provisionally graded players.
- (b) Provisionally graded players (shown by asterisk) - those who have at least eight recorded results against recognised or provisionally graded players.

Report on ICCF Presidium Meeting In Paris - 21st to 29th August 1982 (by Alan Borwell)

The ICCF Presidium was held in the Pavillon Hotel, Paris and both George Livie and I attended the meetings for the full period. The French Correspondence Chess Federation were hosts to delegates from some 20 countries and arrangements were made by André Giraudet the French delegate, who is also a Vice-President of ICCF.

After cordial words of welcome from the President of the French Federation and other chess dignitaries from the host country, the Praesidium was opened by Hans-Werner von Massow the ICCF President. He referred to the deaths of Dr. Charles S. Hunter, a BPCF Life Vice-President, and his wife Barbara earlier this year. They had been most hospitable to us last year in London and Charles had helped considerably during the discussions which we had with the ICCF President and other officials at last year's Congress.

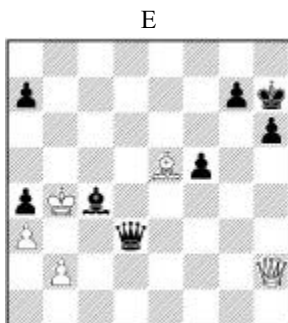
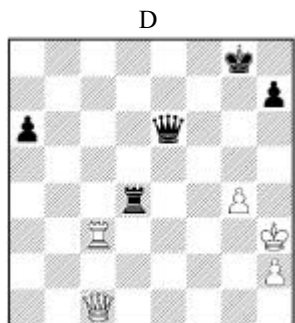

Letter from Douglas Bryson

Alan Borwell referred in Bulletin No.8 to the game against Carlos Bet where he misread a move of his opponent and played on under this misapprehension until a move from his opponent, which he had thought impossible made him realise his earlier error.

I have always meant to ask him, since you are required to repeat your opponent's moves in international games, whether Alan had written down the move which he thought his opponent had played.

If Alan did not make a correct repetition which is required by the rules (I quote from ICCF Rule 2, 'The correct repetition of ... the opponent's last move... is mandatory') then his opponent did not let Alan know of his incorrect repetition. Thus all further moves in the game were invalid and Alan need not have resigned after all!

(Editor - I asked Alan for his comments and he agrees with Douglas about the content of the rules. However, what he cannot remember is whether he actually repeated his opponent's last move or if he wrote down the move he had assumed had been played! As the card would have been in the possession of his opponent, Alan could only have checked by having his earlier card returned. He did not feel that this would have been justified and preferred to resign rather than to try to dispute the matter on the technicality when it was really his own fault for not reading his opponent's move correctly.)
