As for myself, the summer months were taken up with a revision of the Association's Playing Rules. New competitions had to be taken into account and also the revised time controls. I have tried to cut down on a few ambiguities and make it clearer to interpret the rules with set penalties for failure to comply. Obviously I have not made radical changes and the Executive Committee have sanctioned the revised version recently. However, I would like to ask you to write to me with any suggestions you may have for further improvement (with reasons).

Well that's it for this edition. I hope you all found some sunshine somewhere for your summer break and are now ready for the new postal chess season.

## SCOTTISH CORRESPONDENCE CHESS ASSOCIATION

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held in Chess Suppliers (Scotland) Ltd., 15 Hope Street, Glasgow on Sunday 23rd June 1985 at 2.15pm.

Present: A.P. Borwell (President), C.R. Beecham, A. Hind, G.W.G. Livie, K.B. McAlpine, A.J. McClelland, G.D. Pyrich, T. Russell, A.J. Shaw.

Apologies were received from K.A. Gordon, A.T. Hislop, D.M. Livie and R. Mitchell.

The Minutes of the previous AGM held on 10th June 1984, which were published in Bulletin No.14, were approved.

### Secretary's Report

The Secretary gave a brief summary of a year in which progress had been made. In domestic competitions the number of members had grown, although not dramatically. There were fewer teams competing in the Leagues, but there were still 4 divisions of 6 teams.

This year would achieve the transition from a one to two-year Championship and Candidates. Although next year would be the real test, the reaction so far had been favourable. Our new venture into the "Grand Open" was encouraging, with 16 sections of 7 players, bringing more Full Members and Bulletin Subscribers.

There had been success for Scottish players in British events, including Douglas Bryson as British Champion, Eddie Davis who won the 2nd Grand Open, and Alan McGowan who won the Police Correspondence Championship.

Internationally our Olympiad and European teams continued to do well, with several players in contention for IM titles and norms. We were organising the Scottish Chess Centenary tournament, the 2nd North Atlantic Team tournament and were well prepared for hosting the ICCF Congress in Peebles.

Finally, the major project over the summer months would be on a revision to the current Rules Brochure to be available for the start of the next season.

### Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer apologised that no printed or audited accounts were available for the meeting. The position as reported at the last Executive Meeting was of a surplus of £160 on normal activities and this should be a fairly indicative figure. (The accounts for the year ended 31st March 1985 were subsequently completed and presented to the Executive Committee showing a surplus for the year of £269.04 - see pages 4/5 for details).

Active fund-raising activities were continuing. A second prize draw had raised several hundred pounds and the "100 Club", although not quite living up to its name, was a good source of regular income.

The Treasurer expressed confidence in the Association's ability to meet all its impending obligations and gave thanks to Vice President George Livie for his assistance in the above-mentioned fund-raising activities.

In conclusion, the Treasurer intimated that he would like to stand down due to business commitments. However, if no replacement could be found immediately, then he would continue for one more year only.

Messrs. D.M. Livie and T. Russell were also elected to the Executive Council. In accordance with recent discussions between the Association and the SCA, Mr. G. Pyrich would be its representative on our Executive Council. The Secretary was directed to inform the SCA that it had been agreed that Mr. Pyrich should also be our representative to the SCA.

### Election of Auditor

Subject to the successful completion of the annual audit, the Secretary was asked to accord thanks to the Auditor, Mr. H. Bell, and invite him to continue as our Auditor in the following year.

### Subscriptions

It was proposed and unanimously agreed that there be no increase in subscription rates for the coming season.

### Any Other Business

It was felt by the Secretary that it was a good idea to have the flexibility to start sections of Premier, Major or Quartet up to a month later than the official start date for the season. This would allow late applications to be considered and the meeting duly empowered him to do this.

The President gave a brief outline of the proposals for the ICCF Congress in Peebles. On Monday and Tuesday, 2nd and 3rd September, there would be business meetings which any member of the host Association could attend.

It was hoped that friendly Internationals against Italy and Israel could be arranged in the coming year.

There being no further business, the meeting closed at 4.15pm.

## HANDICAP TOURNAMENT (by Allan Hislop)

### Time for a Change?

I have noticed a marked drop in the number of results and requests for new games coming in these past few months.

This is due to the new playing time of thirty days for ten moves introduced this season to the Handicap Tournament. It has resulted in games taking longer to end and subsequently fewer players are able to take on more games during the season. The few who do ask are having to wait too long for pairings.

It seems to me that the vast majority of players make their commitment at the beginning of the season as to how many tournaments they can take on. In the case of the Handicap, if they play in it for a season and obtain a result, that satisfies them. They then make new commitments at the start of a new season which may or may not include the Handicap.

The article by R. Gillman about the "Ascension" Tournament in the previous issue of the magazine prompted me to look at the structure of the Handicap. Despite explaining that it is played on level terms, many players look on it with some suspicion and no wonder since the title is a misnomer.

Well, in this column about Handicap news, I would suggest that the title "Handicap" be changed and the format should be altered.

What I propose and what I shall work for in Committee is that the title be changed to "Individual League Championship".

Also that the format of six classes at present be changed to form four divisions, named ONE, TWO, THREE and FOUR.

Seven players in each division, all play all, one game per opponent.

Thirty days for ten moves.

The winner of each division to be declared Division Champion.

The winner of the First Division to be called INDIVIDUAL LEAGUE CHAMP.

Promotion and relegation - two up and two down.

Season to start mid-October and end mid-September.

I will be discussing this in committee and if I don't get vetoed, then I would hope to see it introduced in 1986. As for present "Handicappers", I should hope they would make up the nucleus of this new tournament. Comments to me, please, so that I can be armed with your views. A note with your results would help, or write to the News Bulletin Editor with your views.

This year's ICCF Congress took place in Scotland at Peebles Hotel Hydro from 1st to 8th September. It was a memorable occasion with 40 delegates from 24 countries attending the meetings, along with another 15 friends who accompanied the delegates.

Most of the visitors arrived on Saturday 31st August and were collected by SCCA officials from Edinburgh and Glasgow air and rail terminals. In the evening, some 25 brave travellers attended the final late night performance of the Edinburgh Tattoo and Fireworks Display. It poured down all the way to the Tattoo and all the way back to Peebles, but the rain abated and the full moon shone during the display! It was a fitting welcome for our visitors, including friends from Canada, USA and Argentina, a good Scandinavian contingent, and European countries.

The Opening Ceremony on the Sunday morning began with words of welcome from myself as President of the host country's correspondence chess association and then from Bill Smerdon, President of the SCA, our "over the board" association. The ICCF President, Hans-Werner von Massow from BRD, then responded and referred to historical chess events in both Scotland specifically and in Britain more generally. He mentioned in particular that ICCF was very pleased that the Congress was taking place in Scotland as part of the programme of celebrations of the Scottish Chess Centenary.

Herr von Massow then announced his intention to retire in 1987, when he will be 75 years old, after a quarter of a century as ICCF President. This will be the year when the next 4-yearly elections are due and the Congress will be held in the Netherlands, the country of his proposed successor Henk Mostert, the current General Secretary.

On the evening of Sunday 1st, the SCCA were hosts at the Opening Banquet and the management of the Hydro provided a real "Taste of Scotland" with a menu of Cockie Leekie Soup, Haggis and Neeps (with Piper and Whisky, of course), Scottish Beef carved in the Dining Room, and to finish off in style, the sweet "Border Beacons" was piped into the darkened ballroom - it was a very impressive start to the week!

The main business meetings took place on Monday and Tuesday with morning, afternoon and evening sessions, and a brief outline of the proceedings follows.

In the General Secretary's Report, Mr. Mostert referred to a proposal from Argentina that Honorary Membership of ICCF be awarded to Ing Paul Diaconescu from Roumania in recognition of his attendance at all ICCF meetings since 1965 and for his work for ICCF. This was adopted unanimously and with acclamation. Mr. Mostert also expressed the hope that Mr. Diaconescu would succeed him as General Secretary, should that post become vacant in 1987.

Frau Bertl-von-Massow gold medals for 15 years' meritorious service were then presented to J.A. Cornu (Switzerland), E. Fiandor (Spain), Dr. R. Incelli (Italy) and H. Rabold (DDR), and silver medals for 10 years' meritorious service to W. Bielecki (Poland), A. Lascurain (Argentina) and B. Olafsson (Iceland). Messrs. Cornu, Incelli and Lascurain were present to receive the medals in person from Herr von Massow.

The reports of the Tournament Director and World and Tournament Offices indicated a steady increase in entries to the various ICCF individual tournaments. Reports on North America, Latin-American and Anglo-Pacific Tournaments were followed by a report by the ICCF Liaison Officer to FIDE.

It was then my turn, as ICCF Treasurer, to report to Congress and this included presentation of the audited accounts for 1984. Although ICCF is in a healthy financial position, expenditure has exceeded income for several years and therefore I proposed the adoption of increased membership and tournament entry fees, which had been intimated in advance in Pula last year. All of the proposed new fees were adopted later in the meetings by majority voting and will become operative from 1.1.86.

Congress confirmed that there should be 6 sections for the 16th World CC Championship Semifinal, and included in the participants are: Philip Giulian (Scotland), G.H. Davies (Eng), C.R. Chandler (Eng), A. Doyle (Ire), each playing in different sections.

Various points were discussed by the Rules Committee, but most of them were deferred for further consideration prior to and at next year's Praesidium meeting in Switzerland (at Baden, 6th to 14th September 1986).

The Chairman of the Working Group for Rating, Mr. Nol van't Riet presented the first ICCF grading list at 1.1.85 containing players who have completed more than 30 games in ICCF events since 1978. It is the intention in future to include the results of all games completed in tournaments at the end of the previous year, even where the event has not been concluded. It is also envisaged that ratings will be used for title qualification purposes in the future but considerable work will be necessary before this can be achieved. Currently there are only a few Scottish players in the list due to the minimum number of games required, but this should be increased considerably when Olympiad, European TT and Invitation events etc are included. The Working Group was complimented on its tremendous work, which included the rating of 92,934 games played by 6,648 different players throughout the world in tournaments completed between 1950 to 1984.

The Congress then moved on to discuss Tournament arrangements and, in particular, the next World Cup. A very comprehensive method of pairings was proposed by Herr Heitmann of BRD and this was adopted.

It was agreed that the event would be announced in October 1985, with a closing date for entries of 30th June and a start date in October 1986. World Cup VI/VII would be organised by the Polish CC Federation and would carry the supplement "In Memoriam Bertl von Massow".

Two ladies events will begin soon - the 4th Ladies CC Olympiad for teams and the 1st Ladies European Individual Championship. It is hoped that Scotland will be represented in both of these events.

Title norms were agreed for various invitation tournaments and some proposed new events were approved.

Towards the end of the business meetings, the Cuban delegate arrived in Peebles, having had problems with flights from Havana and his luggage being misplaced in Madrid. Useful meetings were held with Mr. Yance Ramirez and an increase in Cuban involvement in ICCF events can be anticipated.

On the social side, we had arranged several sightseeing trips for our visitors, the first of which on Wednesday 5th was an excursion by coach to the Trossachs, calling en route at the Heritage Centre at Bannockburn. The weather was not on our side, but we all braved a trip on the steamer on Loch Katrine!

Delegates spent Thursday morning sightseeing in Edinburgh (and no doubt stocking up on gifts for home!) and returned to the hotel in the afternoon for the Simultaneous Display by Douglas Bryson. Douglas took on 10 of the delegates and emerged with a score of 7-3, which was excellent considering the strength of some of his opponents.

On Friday, there was a visit to the Border Country, including calls at Melrose Abbey and Sir Walter Scott's house at Abbotsford.

After agreement of the Congress Minutes on the morning of Saturday 8th, delegates took part in a Blitz Tournament which was won by Hermann Heemsoth IM (BRD) with myself as runner-up. In the evening, the Hydro provided another splendid Banquet, with ICCF as hosts this time.

Most of the delegates returned home on the Sunday morning and many have written to say how much they enjoyed their visit to Scotland. The Peebles Hotel Hydro was an excellent venue and the hospitality provided by the hotel staff and the efforts of our Committee Members were greatly appreciated by the delegates.

There is a splendid spirit in ICCF in keeping with its motto "Amici Sumus" ("we are friends"). The annual meetings are most valuable in achieving very close co-operation between countries from all parts of the globe. Next year's meeting in Switzerland will be followed by the Netherlands in 1987, Denmark in 1988 and probably Italy in 1989 - in fact, Finland (for 1991) and Poland (for 1993) also extended invitations.

#### Editor's Note

The total cost of hosting the ICCF Congress in Scotland was around £3,500. This had been anticipated and funds raised over the last few years entirely by Scotland's own efforts, were specifically earmarked for this purpose. There is little doubt that Scotland's position in ICCF and International Correspondence Chess circles has been strengthened by our hosting of this year's Congress.



#### Games from the CENTENARY TOURNAMENT

The Scottish Centenary International Invitation Tournament is now well underway and a progress report appears elsewhere in this Bulletin.

Our first game is between Grandmaster Matyas Berta and IM Janko Bohak both from Yugoslavia. 





# CLASSIC GAMES OF CORRESPONDENCE CHESS

selected and annotated by JOHN HAWKES

Our game this time is between the legendary Russian GM, V.V.Ragozin and Dr. V.Bergraser from France, who became a GM in 1981. This fascinating encounter took place in the late 1950's in the 2nd World Correspondence Chess Championship, which was won eventually by Ragozin ahead of Endzelins, Australia, and Lothar Schmid of West Germany.

Kings Indian Defence (E 71)







BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIP 1984-5 (by Douglas Bryson)

Bort once observed that "chess is all about patience". Seemingly trite, one will realise how very true this comment is on playing postal opponents from Eastern Europe where one move per month is standard.

C.H.O.D. Alexander pointed out "... a curious phenomenon can be observed with some opponents that the more difficult the position, the longer it seems to take your letters to reach them. In my experience, this effect is particularly marked in Bulgaria. Any serious threat on my part seemed to paralyse the Bulgarian postal service to such an extent that I began to feel nervous about dislocating the entire Bulgarian economy and bringing the country to a standstill!"

But there is no need to conduct chess at snail's pace if you seek strong opposition. I would recommend playing in the British Championships which run from October to July. Since first class post is compulsory, you can usually manage at least one move per week.

In the 1984/5 British Championship there were 5 players with OTB grades of over 2200. However, a feature of this tournament is that everyone is dangerous, eg. I provided I.D. Thomson with his only win. No doubt Phil (Giulian) would have fared better if he had not had 40 other games to contend with in the early stage of this tournament.



## SCOTTISH CENTENARY INTERNATIONAL TOURNAMENT

The results are now coming in regularly for our first international title tournament. Although Dr. M. 
