As you can see from the Office-Bearers panel, there has been one very significant change, with Alan Hind having retired as SCCA Secretary after 15 years' service. Since 1983, Alan has been responsible for all the Association's domestic tournaments and it has been very much due to his efforts that these have run smoothly for so many years. Although we now have a separate Membership Officer, the job of receiving entry forms, chasing up forgetful members and dealing with a myriad of enquiries has been mainly the task of our Secretary. We are pleased that Alan will be continuing to be involved with the Association "behind the scenes" and thank him sincerely for his dedicated efforts and caring approach throughout his period in office. A full report on the AGM appears on pages 4/5 of this edition.

On the playing front, there is an exciting finish in prospect in the 1997/8 Scottish Championship and the Scotland "A" team is well placed to qualify for the Final of the first ICCF Email Team Tournament. The new CC Olympiad Final XII and Preliminaries XIII have now begun but the medals in Final XI have still not been decided. There is a very close battle between the combined Czech/Slovak team and Germany for Gold/Silver and Russia has closed the gap on Canada/Scotland, although still needing 3 points from 5 games, for the Bronze placing.

In September, George Pyrich and I will be attending the ICCF Congress in Riga, Latvia when many important issues concerning the future of international correspondence chess in all its forms (post, fax and Email) will be discussed and decided. For those of you who are already connected to the net, you will be aware of its great potential for Email CC as a cheap, efficient and speedy communications channel, especially for international games/news, etc.

For over six years, George Pyrich has been your Games Editor and has done an excellent job! However, he has many other responsibilities and Bernard Milligan has kindly agreed to take over this role. At the recent Executive Meeting, it was also agreed that the SCCA should develop a "Games Archive" and Tournament Controllers will be asked to send all gamescores to Alan Armstrong, for inputting into an SCCA database. Bernard and Alan will work together and, hopefully, secure interesting annotated games for publication in the magazine!

Due to administrative and domestic reasons, it will be necessary for the publication dates for future Scottish CCA Magazines to be modified and further details are shown on page 3. We hope that this will not inconvenience or disappoint our valued members/subscribers.

Scottish CCA Magazine - Publication Dates

We have had considerable problems in producing magazines just before Christmas, immediately after the AGM and before/coinciding with the ICCF Congress in late September/early October. Therefore, we have had to review our schedules, including the SCCA Magazine, ICCF commitments, Church Magazine and family holidays (normally early October but also a visit to Australia over the next Christmas/New Year period to watch some cricket!)

Although it is intended to continue with the current quarterly editions in Winter, Spring, Summer and Autumn each year, the planned publication dates will be varied beginning with the next edition. The forward plan is as follows:-

- ◆ **Autumn edition** Planned publication/distribution - late October/early November
(containing ICCF Congress Report)
- ◆ **Winter edition** Planned publication/distribution - late January/early February
(containing final results in all domestic competitions)
- ◆ **Spring edition** Planned publication/distribution - late April/early May
(containing details of new domestic competitions)
- ◆ **Summer edition** Planned publication/distribution - late July/early August
(containing SCCA AGM report and new Rating List)

Annual subscribers will receive Spring/Summer/Autumn/Winter editions (i.e. the subscription will cover the 4 editions published in each SCCA financial year). Of course, 1998 subscribers will receive both Autumn and Winter 1998/9 editions, with new 1999 subscribers receiving a complimentary copy of the Winter 1998/9 edition plus the next four editions.

Articles/letters/news from members/subscribers are requested for the Magazine and annotated games are greatly appreciated by our Games Editor. For inclusion in future editions, they should reach us at least one month prior to the planned publication dates shown above.

SCOTTISH CORRESPONDENCE CHESS ASSOCIATION

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held at The Ginger Jar Coffee Shop, Galashiels on Sunday 7th June 1998.

Present: D.A.Kilgour (President), A.Armstrong, R.W.M.Baxter, A.P.Borwell, A.Hind, S.Mackenzie, I.Mackintosh, B.Milligan, G.D.Pyrich and I.Sneddon.

Apologies: C.R.Beecham and T.Thomson.

President's Remarks

The President welcomed everyone to the meeting and summarised what he believed had been an overall positive season, with exciting developments on the Internet giving the potential for reaching out to many more people through the Association's new website and Email tournaments. Financially, although the accounts showed a loss for the year, there were some significant non recurring items of expenditure.

The Minutes of the last Annual General Meeting held on 1 June 1997, which were published in Magazine No. 58, were approved.

Secretary's Report

The Secretary reported the following:

- In terms of membership, the Association appeared to be rather static, and there were also fewer players competing in the Major and Minor tournaments. There were no apparent reasons and it was despite the considerable efforts of the Membership & Publicity Officer, Bernard Milligan in looking for and encouraging potential new members and tournament participants.
- In the domestic tournaments ending in 1997 there was no concluding Championship, but this situation appeared to have been a "one-off" as entries for Candidates and Premiers had been encouraging. There were again three divisions in the League which, as usual, were highly competitive.
- The Association continued to be indebted to the hard work put in by the Tournament Controllers, without whom there would be no domestic competitions.
- The Rules Brochure had been revised to take account of ICCF changes and new tournament types (e.g. Endgame, Fax, Email) and the Association's grading structure had also been revamped. A great deal of work had been undertaken on these projects by Bernard Milligan and Raymond Baxter respectively.
- The Association's website had been successfully set up with a lot of hard work in design and development by Iain Mackintosh and Jim Falconer. The site was being visited regularly and could provide the Association with many potential new members. It is well worth visiting!

The Secretary announced that he would not be seeking re-election. Pressures of work and family commitments meant that too much work was having to be squeezed into too little time and it was with some regret that he was having to make this decision. He summarised the major changes in the Association that had taken place in the 15 years since he took on the position (two ICCF Congresses hosted, new GM's and IM's, official recognition by ICCF and a key involvement by Scottish officials at all levels within ICCF) and stated that he took great pleasure from having been involved in some small way with it all.

Alan Borwell, on behalf of the Association, proposed a vote of thanks for the excellent work done by the Secretary over his period in office.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer presented audited accounts for the year to 31 March 1998 (see details on following pages).

Minor comments were made and movements from previous year explained. Specific comments were:

- 1998 showed a loss of £550 compared to a surplus of £675 in 1997.
- The additional expenses of the ICCF Congress, which had been hosted in Argentina in 1997, and the assistance in the purchase of a computer for the Publicity & Membership Officer, were the principal adverse movements.
- Magazine sales had been consistent, but printing and distribution costs had increased by around 25%.

No questions being asked, the accounts were accepted unanimously.

International Secretary's Report

The International Secretary reported the following:

- The year had been a positive one in terms of the Association's performance and representation in ICCF events. In the year to come we could look forward to further opportunities for success.
- Scotland had finished all games in the Olympiad Final XI and were guaranteed to finish at worst level fourth. This had been a tremendous achievement and of great credit to the participants and the Association.
- Our former President (and current Executive member) Alan Borwell, had duly been elected President of ICCF in Argentina last year.
- The Association had a new IM-designate in Life Member Joe Watson and a new International Arbiter in George Livie.

Alan Borwell, on behalf of ICCF, informed the meeting that George Pyrich's contribution to ICCF as Qualifications Commissioner had been outstanding in terms of presentation and content and was a great credit to the Association.

The Executive Committee was delegated the authority to appoint an Assistant Secretary, when a suitable candidate had been identified. It was also desirable to have separate officials as President and Treasurer and suitable consideration would also be given to this objective during the next term of office.

Thanks were given to all for their efforts over the last year.

Election of Auditor

It was agreed that Mr Stuart Mackenzie be officially appointed for the ensuing year.

Subscriptions

It was unanimously agreed that the subscriptions for 1998/9 would be unchanged i.e. ordinary membership would remain at £15 and life membership would remain at £75.

It was further agreed that there would be no increase to tournament fees.

The only change which was proposed and unanimously agreed, was that the magazine cover price be raised to £3 per issue, with a consequent annual subscription (including postage) of £12 for UK subscribers. Overseas subscriptions were set at £20 for one year or £30 for two years. These increases reflected the considerable rise in printing costs as shown in the accounts. The above changes would make membership even more attractive, as it would be only £3 more than a separate magazine subscription.

MY GLITTERING CAREER

[by Peter Jack]

This autumn marks the twentieth year of my pushing pawns by post. To mark this august event I propose to share some of the invaluable insights vouchsafed to me during these years in the hope that some of our younger readers may find them of interest. These appear in no particular order, a bit like my thought processes really.

Books. When I started I considered it unsporting to consult books. I have difficulty in remembering how innocent I was in those days. In 1978 there were no databases. Of which more later. Then I didn't have many books to consult. In my first year I won one game and managed to be mated in another which came as rather a surprise. Since then I have accumulated a yard of mostly unread tomes. Some of them deal with specific openings and have been acquired from a mail-order company not a million miles away from a certain dormitory town in Perthshire, whose proprietors I have sworn to secrecy as to the nature of my acquisitions. If a book works, fine, if not tough. I recently found myself in a position which GM Gallacher gave as advantageous to White. Four moves later Black had battered me into resignation. I sometimes feel that what we are engaged in is an exercise in "My book is better than your book." If we're honest, one of the main attractions of CC is that you don't have to spend every waking moment memorising screeds of analysis, most of which you're never going to use. Life is too short. Sooner or later most games go into the unknown and then it's up to you to produce the goods. Analysis may be mentioned here. I once spent an afternoon analysing the way I thought a particular game was going to develop. This taught me the utter futility of attempting to work out what the opposition is going to do next. Particularly tricky is the vexed question of endgame analysis. Can be useful to convince the opponent of the utter awfulness of their position but extremely annoying when the position shown to be garbage is yours. Best avoided.

Playing up, playing up and playing the game. Another attraction of CC is you never meet the opposition. I was once at a meeting where I came across someone I was a pawn up against (syntactically tortuous but you know what I mean). I introduced myself and then didn't know what to say next. These days I am becoming terser and terser. "Brusque" would be the word my wife would choose. I have no intention of being discourteous but I feel a discreet 1-0 or 0-1 says it all. If I omit a cordial "Well played" it's because I pushed the self-destruct button and know it.

Winning. Better than coming in second. Be magnanimous. If asked by opponent as to the reasons for his loss, be tactful.

Losing. Attempt to be graceful. (See above). Excuses never go down well. I don't believe the ones trotted out to me either.

Drawing. A fair result that reflects credit to both sides. I have had one draw that was straight from a K-K game and another that came straight from the pages of a book. Nothing wrong with that. Half a point is half a point. Learning how to offer a draw is something you'll all have to work out for yourselves. Similarly what to do if offered a draw.

Resignation. Becoming easier each year. Rise above loss. Remember, you now have more time to devote to your remaining games.

Computers and databases. I'm just peevy because I can't beat my Novag Ruby. Databases give you more information to drown in. By the way, has anyone yet owned up to consulting a computer in the course of a game?

Envelopes. Envelope chicken can develop into an interesting diversion, the first person to use a new envelope being declared the unofficial loser. If an envelope is capable of being re-used, I don't see why not but a day must come when envelope heaven beckons and with a fond *nunc dimittis* the old servant is replaced by a new one.

Competitions. I only play in the Challenge now and a few internationals. Any ambitions I have left are centred on Europe. After a few ICCF European III tournaments I made it into a European II tournament. I was shredded.

Concentration. Try and have some. Avoid outside distractions, particularly membership of boat club committees.

Answering moves. It can pay to be laid back about this. If the time control gives you time, use it. Stagger posting moves if possible to avoid those stomach churning mornings when the doormat is awash with moves.

Thinking. Overrated. Some of my finest blunders have arisen from the delusion that I was strengthening the centre, applying pressure, improving the position or generally being clever. Big mistake. If in need of reassurance for any decision, fall back on the Nimzowitschean Mysterious Move. Failing which "It seemed like a good idea at the time" covers a multitude of sins.

OTB or "real" chess. Treat with caution. I spend quite a few evenings in the local booze boutique armed with a pocket set and some improving literature. One night recently the local bowlers fell in from the club up the road and one of them challenged me. Foolishly I accepted. I lost. I have not spoken to him since. Some of the customers with longer memories are never going to let me forget this one. Should this situation befall in future, I intend to assume a rueful expression and confess that I am only a learner.

Bogeymen. We all have them and even when you finally manage to give some longtime antagonist the drubbing they have so richly deserved for years, there is always another one waiting in the wings. No names, no pack drill but you know who you are.

Twenty years and almost three scorebooks later, I still wonder what the attraction of CC is. Sometimes when I play through old games I have a quiet feeling of pride of the "I-did-that" variety for the wins, while some of the losses make me ask why I bother getting up in the mornings. The dizzy heights of success and I are no strangers. After I came first in the old Handicap I realised my career had peaked and that it was all downhill from then on. I think that the main ambition I have left is to play one season without blundering.

Dream on.

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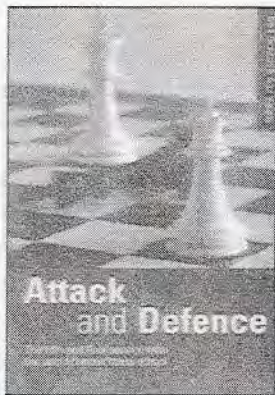
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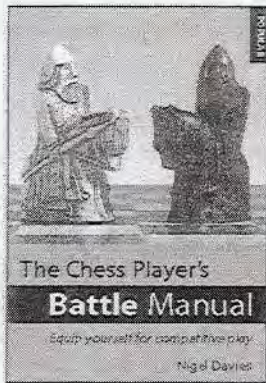
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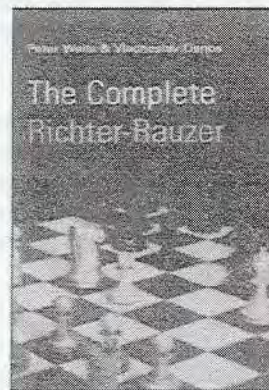
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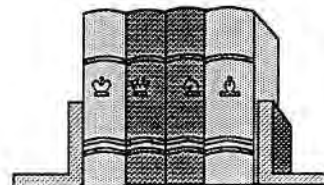

Grading List 1998

[by Raymond Baxter]

The grades shown in this list take account of all games reported to the Grading Officer by 31/12/97. These grades will be used for games starting in 1998. All SCCA events listed in the magazine are included, except the Openings and Endgame tournaments. Friendly internationals are also included if the opponent's grade is known. Grades are calculated for players who have had eight or more results, provided these results were against graded players, or against ungraded players for whom it has been possible to estimate a grade.

Last year the SCCA grades were increased by up to 200 points. This makes them more consistent with the ICCF grades, but it does mean that for those who play both correspondence and over-the-board chess, their correspondence grades may well be substantially higher than their over-the-board grades.

Only games between human opponents have been taken into account. Results against the Sapphire computer in the Challenge tournament have been excluded. However, it may be of interest to note that Sapphire scored 7 out of 8 against an average grade of 1910, and would have been given an initial grade of 2150, if it had been eligible.

The method of calculation was set out in magazine No.54 of July 1996. Since then a few changes have been made to improve the calculations, particularly for those with less than 30 results. If you would like to see details of your own grade calculations, or if you think the data held for you may be wrong, let me know.

Where an SCCA member has a grade published in the ICCF list of 1/7/98, then this grade is shown, marked "i". A provisional grade (i.e. one based on less than 30 results) is marked with an asterisk.

Second in the new series of publications, containing annotated CC games from around the world. Once again, there are no acknowledgements to annotators or publications, which is very disappointing.

There are 19 rather old games by leading GM Timmerman (NLD) but also recent games played in some ICCF Email tournaments. A rather strange selection, with a strong indication of little editorial work and heavy reliance on computer databases.

**Winning with the Sicilian Defence
Complete Repertoire against 1 e4**
by IM Jeremy Silman
353 pages, £13.99

The recommended main variation is the Accelerated Dragon with 1 e4 c5 2 Nf3 Nc6 3 d4 cxd4 4 Nxd4 g6, but it also covers different moves by White such as 2 Nc3, 2 d4, 2 f4, 2 b4 etc.

An interesting book for Sicilian addicts wishing to direct the early opening along their own chosen path. In my younger days, I did not like facing the Maroczy Bind (c4) or the Rossolino Variation (Bb5) but nowadays these are not so powerful for White, if Black plays accurately and actively.

The spearhead and solid pawn structure of the early opening of the Colle, provide White with a springboard to launch an attack. An advantage is that this system can be set up against almost any black formation.
